


Newsletter November 2023



Our guest speaker, Heather Malone, from Pukekohe, was introduced by Sandra.

Heather spoke at length about Koputaroa, Ihakara and Heatherlea areas. Heather was born in Otaki but resided in Koputaroa until shifting to Hamilton as a young child where she grew up. She decided during the covid lockdowns she would write a history starting from 1949 of the people who lived in the Koputaroa areas. She sourced the names from Electoral rolls at that time. 130 families were contacted and are in the book along with a lot of history, photos and some newspapers of that time. She stressed the importance of naming people in our photos, as many were unknown in the photos she sourced. She had family members in the photos, some she didn't know, and emphasised how important it is to ask our mothers and fathers about who people are and also for us to pass on this information and knowledge to our children and grandchildren.

Heather was first elected woman to be on the Hamilton Council. She said how difficult this job was in a male dominated group, how she was charged with pecuniary attempts, she challenged the Auditor Generals decision to have her removed and was eventually apologised to and she was reinstated. She stood for Mayor of Franklin and was mayor for six years. She said it was a huge learning curve, a vast area to cover, not without some threats and abuse. She got to meet royalty on their visits to NZ.

She got nominated in 2009 for an award for services to the community but has seldom worn the medal.

She encouraged us to have a go at opportunities given to us and stressed the importance of Leadership in whatever we do. Inspiring others to follow our example.

Glad I only had one!"




LITERACY FOCUS Christmas Holiday Reading


