President-Elect's, it is now time to start planning for your tenure-ship. Start thinking about what you want to achieve, your direction, your goals for your club? It is never too early to start the planning process. You don't need to wait until you are officially sworn in. You want to hit the ground running! Hopefully this message was loud and clear at our recent workshop help on 29th February.

We will be running a further workshop for our President-Elect's before the final workshop at the conference in May. We are aiming to have the incoming presidents fully primed and prepped for their role. All fired up and ready for their journey in leading their team.

Foundation Chair - Alison Burr (Cambridge)

Foundation Grant applications due September 15th 2024

Remember that those clubs who had successful applications in September 2023 are not able to submit an application this time.

Two clubs had their applications declined last time, the reason given being:

The regulations in the US imposed on 501©3 nonprofits does not allow the Foundation to provide funds for fundraisers for other nonprofits regardless of how worthwhile they are. The foundation is allowed to pay for any fundraisers that it performs but we cannot fund fundraisers for other non-profits.

I have not found this amongst information within the Grant application criteria thus am seeking further clarification which I will pass onto Foundation Liaisons, once received.





Liaison – Pam Hayes (Tauranga)

As our International Project I want to remind clubs of our commitment to this most worthy organisation. For District Fifteen it makes financial sense to support DFG NZ rather than sending funds overseas.

The cyclone season will come to an end around April and two ships, the Sea Mercy and YWAM will head towards Fiji with Kits for distribution in the Pacific. Sea Mercy have advised that they can take as many kits as we have.

DFG NZ continue to liaise with the Fijian Government to be able to include undies in the kits rather than purchase them in Fiji but concede that the soaps will be purchased in Fiji. Helen Griffin, NZ Country Coordinator, reports that DFG NZ attract 25% discount on undies purchased from the Warehouse. They are expecting 1,000 metres of plain dyed flannelette specifically for DFG and will be expecting teams around the country to purchase 100 metres at a time.

All of this requires financial support from the likes of our Clubs, and I ask that incoming Boards consider allocating such funds when setting budgets and fundraising targets for the new Altrusa year. Of course, any surplus funds from this years' fundraising activities would be gratefully received by DFG New Zealand.



A very big thank you to everyone who put forward creative, well thought out, new names for the DSB. We had over 100 responses to the survey.

You gave the board a lot to consider.

We are also grateful for the contributions from those who assisted with the newly designed title page. And to our survey coordinator.

Our DSB editors are excited to have a new name that is the voice of our New Zealand Altrusans.

Levin

We started the year with a social get together joining with the local Lions Club for a round of croquet and afternoon tea and then our members moving on to a pot luck dinner at a member's home – both well attended and lots of fun.

And, then we were at Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-po (Levin Community Centre & Library) – for their first book sale of the year. Our members were rostered throughout day one of the five day sale and were certainly kept very busy. We also volunteered and were rostered to assist at the recent Royal A P & I Show over Anniversary weekend – an annual event held in Levin. Our members looked after the Eftpos office during both days of the show.

On the weekend of 3/4 February our whole club were involved in providing catering at the Horowhenua Harvest Weekend. This was held at a local farm property and attracted exhibitors from around the country showing off their farming, vintage machinery and other great skills. Members provided lunch boxes which included club sandwiches and a muffin which were sold, together with a hot or cold drink. Around 300 lunch packs were made up and funds raised were just over \$2661 (excluding expenses). The balance of funds will be shared between Levin St John Ambulance for their new base which is currently under construction, and the Horowhenua Health Shuttle.

Our January BBQ was held at President Heather de Groens home and garden and it was all about us. The Board catered a beautiful meal.





Thank you to everyone for your contributions, and the awesome photos we have received for this edition. We are loving the activities photos.


We have worked enthusiastically, with help gratefully received from other District Fifteen members, to address the request for a new District Fifteen DSB name, and an updated format for our front page.
