A record of the number of books distributed every month will be tallied to contribute statistics to the Altrusa International Literacy Challenge –

"One million books this biennium". It is believed that already 200+ books have been distributed by the committee related to the following projects:

- Waiopehu College Teen Parent Unit
- Columbian Refugee Families
- Books for Babies
- Hospice magazine subscription

A local council grant awarded to our club is also about to be actioned. The key principle of that project was to encourage young children to embrace books, to stimulate an interest in self-reading, and to promote reading as a family activity. Four areas for distribution of reading material are being considered.

#### Altrusa Club of Levin The Membership Process for New and Returning Members


As an Altrusan, you may at any time, invite a guest to a programme meeting. Whether a potential member or not, please make everyone welcome.

It was with great pride that Sandra, on behalf of the club, presented the funds raised from the Harvest Weekend catering to representatives from the Horowhenua Community Shuttle Service, and Hato Hone St John. Both organisations were very pleased to receive \$900 each.

### March Programme/Dinner Meeting – Hosts Literacy Committee



The theme for the evening was "housing", tables each had china houses on them. Guests and partners were invited, 15 extra attended.

Wayne Bishop, guest speaker, spoke after the main course. He did his building apprenticeship with Crowe builders. After a few years Wayne could see the potential of a housing development in the derelict Kimberley Hospital grounds, he resigned his job, bought the grounds and began the lengthy process of developing Speldhurst into a housing area for people over 60. At that stage he employed 5 staff. After a long process development began. Today Wayne has 150 staff and there are over 500 properties there.

Wayne is keen to develop housing in Mabel Street, and Hinemoa Street extension, these will be for low-income families who have to meet strict criteria. The first half of the Hinemoa Street extension is completed, and all houses occupied.

Tatum Park is in process of having the


historic homestead upgraded for weddings, conferences, motels built and a retirement housing complex to be undertaken. Due to open later this year.

Plans to purchase land off Okarito Ave are under way, 183 properties to be built. Wayne is keen to make housing for young families more accessible with them buying the building only, section remaining with initial owner. This will assist them to own their house at current interest rates.


