RECIPE

Oakhill Potatoes

2 large potatoes
1 slice of bacon or ham
1 onion, finely chopped
1/2 teaspoon mustard
1 cup milk
2 Tablespoons breadcrumbs

2 eggs 2 Tablespoons butter 2 Tablespoons flour ¹/₂ teaspoon salt ¹/₂ cup grated cheese

Scrub potatoes and pierce skin. Microwave until cooked, slice when cool. Hard boil the eggs, slice when cool.

Saute onions and bacon in microwave for 2 minutes

Melt butter and add flour, mustard and salt. Cook gently until the edges are bubbling, remove from heat and add milk, stir carefully until boiling. Simmer 1-2 minutes. Add cheese, keep 2 tablespoons for the topping In an oven proof dish layer the potatoes, eggs and onion/bacon mixture

Pour sauce over the top and sprinkle with the breadcrumbs and remaining cheese. Cook in a moderate oven
