

# **Club Projects and Fundraisers**

#### Pack a Pencil Case Project:

A student named Maddy, who appeared on 'Seven Sharp' was the catalyst for our Pack a Pencil Case Project 3 years ago! The idea was brought to a meeting for approval and so our journey making pencil cases for primary schools and social agencies began.

In July our meeting room was buzzing as we zipped, stitched and packed another 100 pencil cases and that last pencil case filled with stationery made a total of 500 since the project began, all distributed in the South Canterbury area to provide the tools to students to learn.

We are very thankful that members of our community come and assist with the sewing especially the ladies from the Geraldine Patchwork and Craft group. Their expertise with sewing machines and

overlockers is very welcome on the day. Much preparation is done behind the scenes to get the pencil cases prepped for sewing day, but there is a need to come together to complete the project and at this time we learn much about each other as we trim, press and label each one.

Those receiving pencil cases at the beginning of Term 3 were a mix of schools and social agencies and all were well received and still much needed in our community.

#### Women's Refuge:

With money raised from a Quiz Night, the Women's Refuge Project Committee got busy organising and implementing the second part of this project.

After discussions with staff, and as it was still winter time, it was decided that pyjamas, underwear, socks and some cosy blankets would be much appreciated by those being supported through Women's Refuge.

20 drawstring bags were sewn – 10 for boys and 10 for girls, covering ages 2 – 14, then these were filled with a pair of pyjamas, 2 pairs each of underwear and socks. A Tic-Tac-Toe game (made by one of the committee members) was added to the bags for the 7 - 14 year olds, and a soft toy was included in the bags for the younger age groups.

20 further pairs of pyjamas, additional underwear, socks and Tic-Tac-Toe games were also part of the items donated.

7 "No Sew Blankets" made by members at July's Programme Meeting not only looked beautiful, but will provide comfort and warmth to the young people receiving them.

Being able to support Women's Refuge by supplying often needed basics for children in times of crisis was our aim, so many thanks to the Committee responsible for sewing the bags,



shopping, making the games, and packing the bags. Also, thank you to the wider membership for your support with the fundraising and the making of the blankets.

In July when Committee Members delivered the results of their efforts, the Women's Refuge staff were delighted to accept Altrusa's generous donation, and we were assured the items donated would make a difference to many children and families over the coming months.

#### Manaaki Mat Covers:

One of the workshops at Conference earlier this year was the opportunity to make Manaaki Mat Covers. Manaaki Mats are a special cooling pack used in maternity wards, which allow families who have suffered the loss of a baby to hold and keep their baby close for as long as they need.

Finding out that our local maternity ward Jean Todd didn't have anyone sewing these for them, 6 of our members got together and held a sewing afternoon.

Jan and Joan took care of the cutting out, Lorraine, Cathie and Karen completed the sewing, and Gaya turned and pressed the envelope style covers. Within a few hours 70 covers in 4 different sizes were completed.

When three of the group delivered the covers to Jean Todd a few days later, Linda Merrilees, a nurse at Jean Todd, was grateful to receive them, and we were lucky enough to be shown around the unit which brought back many memories for all of us!

Thank you ladies for giving your time and hands on service for this small but very worthwhile project to happen.

#### Baby Bag Project for Newborns:

This project was undertaken by the Literacy Committee and after Jenny met with Linda Merrilees, Jean Todd Maternity Ward, as to what would be suitable for newborns arriving in September, we planned a proposal and budget which was accepted and so the project was 'born'.

Each bag would contain a knitted or sewn beanie, a book, an artisan soap, coffee sachet and chocolates, all contained in a decorated colourful bag with a welcome note attached.

We appreciated Altrusa members and our community knitting the beanies and Eugenia from 7<sup>th</sup> Cloud Soaps supplying her soaps at cost. All other items were purchased locally. An Altrusa sticker was attached to each book.

The bags were decorated at a Programme meeting in August to enable us to deliver some to Jean Todd in time for the 1<sup>st</sup> September while the remainder formed part of the 'hands on' service at the Upper South Island IFF Day.

On September 8<sup>th</sup> International Literacy Day, we presented the bags to nurses and midwives at Jean Todd and were lucky to have a tour through the maternity ward.

The bags were well received by the new parents, and we are suggesting 50 Baby Bags are made available to Jean Todd in 2026
